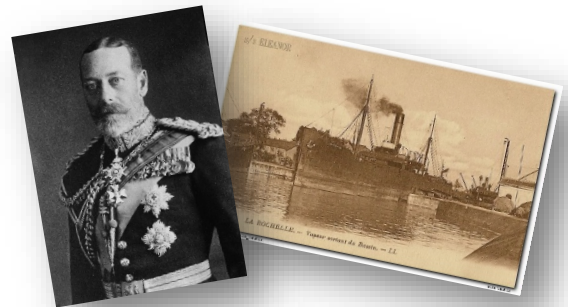

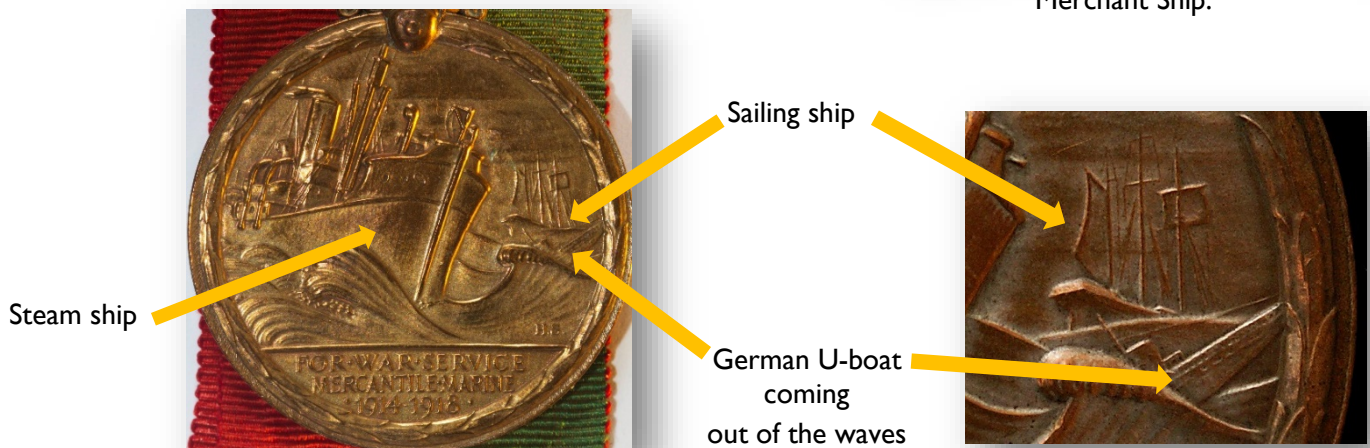
Most of the First World War south coast wrecks were ships that transported people, animals and things: merchant ships.

After the war, King George V created the title 'Merchant Navy' to honour the vital role that such ships played during the war. A new medal was introduced called the Mercantile Marine Medal.

It had the head of King George V on the front, and on the back an image of a ships.



King George V and a First World War Merchant Ship.

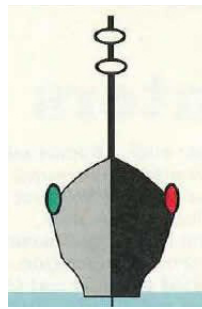


The colours of the medal's ribbon represents the navigation lights on a ship:

Green (starboard/right)

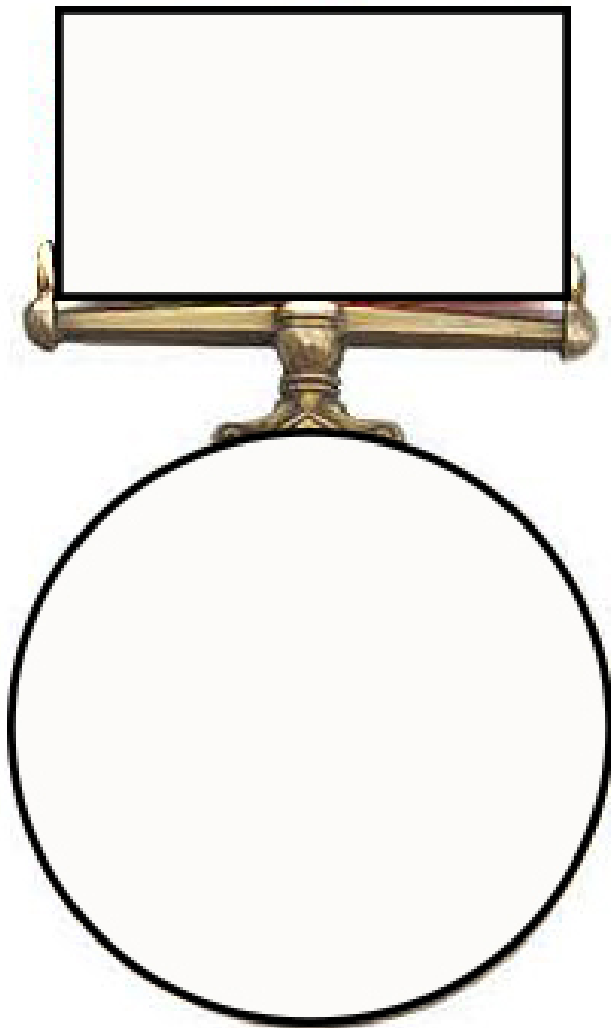
Red (port/left)

White (steaming light on top of mast).
